

American Hydro, LLC's Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains Act Report for 2025 Financial Year

ABOUT THIS REPORT

American Hydro, LLC, has prepared this report (the "**Report**") pursuant to the requirements of the *Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains Act* (the "**Act**") for the financial year that ended March 31, 2026. All references in this Report to "**American Hydro**", "**AH**", "**we**", "**us**", or "**our**" refer to American Hydro, LLC, unless otherwise indicated. This Report constitutes the first report for the 2025 financial year prepared by American Hydro pursuant to the Act. This Report has not been externally assured.

This Report describes the steps taken to enhance transparency in our supply chains by outlining the steps taken during the 2025 financial year to prevent and reduce the risk that forced labour or child labour ("**Modern Slavery**") is used at any step of the production of goods in Canada or elsewhere, or of goods imported into Canada. This has been done in accordance with the mandatory reporting criteria outlined in Sections 11(1) and 11(3) of the Act.

American Hydro does not report under similar legislation in any other jurisdiction.

INTRODUCTION

As a member of the ITOCHU Group, we are guided by our corporate mission, *Sampo-yoshi* (Japanese for "good for all three sides": good for the seller, good for the buyer, and good for society). In accordance with *Sampo-yoshi*, we are committed to serving all stakeholders – including respecting human rights and adhering to all laws and regulations governing human rights (including prohibitions on the use of Modern Slavery). We support international agreements on human rights, including the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the International Labour Organization's Declaration on Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work, and the United Nations Global Compact, which ITOCHU has been a signatory to since 2009.

STRUCTURE, ACTIVITIES AND SUPPLY CHAINS

Company Structure

AH is a privately held company headquartered in York, Pennsylvania. AH is a heavy equipment manufacturer, specializing in custom Engineering and Hydro Turbines.

AH is owned by Industrious Group Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of ITOCHU International Inc., which in turn is a wholly owned subsidiary of ITOCHU Corporation ("**ITOCHU**"). ITOCHU is a publicly traded company headquartered in Tokyo and Osaka, Japan. ITOCHU is listed on the Tokyo Stock Exchange (Ticker Symbol: TYO 8001) and specializes in trading of various products, including textiles, machinery, chemicals, food, IT, and realty.

AH employs approximately **161** people and approximately **two (2)** employees in Canada, while the rest are located in the United States.

Activities and Operations

AH is a hydropower solutions and turbine services company with operations in North America, and provider of hydropower solutions and services in North America, Europe, Latin America and select locations throughout the world. AH builds hydraulic turbines, pump turbines and large pumps in the world, as well as offering custom solutions for upgrading or rehabilitating units. In North America, AH provides design, manufacturing and installation services for the upgrade and refurbishment of hydro turbines for hydro power facilities in the United States and Canada. The majority of AH's design and manufacturing activities are performed in its York, Pennsylvania facility. AH's customers range from independently owned power producers to public utilities or government owned/run organizations, and AH generally contracts directly with customers and vendors in both the USA and Canada for the above services or products. In addition, AH contracts with some non-U.S. or Canadian based suppliers for raw materials, castings, generator components and transportation. These suppliers are generally located in Austria, Spain, Italy, Brazil, and the Czech Republic.

Our Supply Chains

We manage an extensive supply chain network that includes sourcing raw materials, manufacturing, logistics coordination, and the distribution of finished products. We collaborate with numerous local suppliers and service providers in Canada, Austria, Italy, Brazil, Spain, and the United States, ensuring they adhere to our stringent ethical sourcing policies. Our core commitment to preventing modern slavery and human trafficking drives us to work diligently with our suppliers to uphold these standards.

POLICIES AND DUE DILIGENCE

It is our goal to provide a positive work environment and a solid economic foundation upon which all employees may build a future. This is solidified in the policies applicable to AH including our Code of Conduct and Human Rights Policy, set out in further details below.

Code of Conduct

As a member of the ITOCHU Group, we embrace and support the ITOCHU Group's mission and goals, such as embracing a wide range of social responsibilities including legal compliance and implementing corporate ethics through our practices and policies. AH's Code of Conduct (the "**Code**") solidifies this commitment. We expect all employees, including management, to execute business with a thorough comprehension of our Code and underlying corporate mission. Further, all employees and officers are expected to read, understand and abide by the Code, as well as AH's other policies and applicable laws and regulations.

Our Code solidifies our commitment to respecting human rights and all laws and regulations governing human rights (including prohibitions on the use of Modern Slavery). We aim to promote full and productive employment, in accordance with the ITOCHU Group's Human Rights Policy, as described in more detail below. Where appropriate, we also ask our business partners to abide by this Policy and cooperate with us to conduct human rights due diligence.

At AH, safe and respectful workplaces are a priority. As such, we seek to maintain diverse workplaces that are discrimination and harassment-free and provide a safe working environment that protecting the health and safety of our employees.

ITOCHU Group Human Rights Policy

The ITOCHU Group Human Rights Policy (the "**Human Rights Policy**") is applicable to AH as it is imposed upon and adopted by ITOCHU's subsidiaries in various regions around the world, including AH.

Under the Human Rights Policy we support international agreements on human rights, including the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the International Labour Organization's Declaration on Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work, and the United Nations Global Compact, which ITOCHU has been a signatory to since 2009. We comply with all laws and regulations of the countries in which we perform our business activities, and if there are any contradictions between internationally recognized human rights and the laws and ordinances of a country or region, we will seek to maximize respect for international human rights principles.

Due Diligence

We conduct regular audits and provide thorough training to ensure our supply chain operates ethically and responsibly which allows AH to track implementation, impacts, and results, mitigate/prevent adverse impacts, and remediate when/where appropriate. AH also requires employees to sign off annually on the Code of Conduct, which strictly prohibits the use of forced or child labour.

Compliance Hotline

Any action that may conflict with our Code or other internal policies will promptly be reported to the Chief Compliance Officer, the Legal & Compliance Division, or other available resources through AH's Compliance Hotline (the "**Hotline**"). The Hotline can be accessed online or by phone 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

AH will not engage in or permit retaliation of any kind against any person who seeks legal or ethical advice, reports known or suspected misconduct in good faith or cooperates in an investigation. AH will investigate all claims of retaliation and take appropriate corrective action.

POTENTIAL RISKS IN OUR OPERATIONS AND SUPPLY CHAINS

AH's operations and supply chains are predominantly in Canada, Europe, and the United States, which have strict labour and employment laws. In addition, AH aims to take every precaution to research and identify issues while vetting potential suppliers or vendors before introducing them into our supply chain.

Potential Risks in Our Operations

AH considers the risk of Modern Slavery occurring within our operations to be low. Not only our workforce is located solely within Canada and the United States, which have comprehensive and strict labour, employment, and human rights laws, but also as a member of the ITOCHU Group we have a number of strong policies in place regarding labour standards for our employees.

Potential Risks in Our Supply Chains

We understand that geographic considerations, the nature of some of the raw material and particular industries can carry a higher risk of Modern Slavery. There are also risks linked to certain industries even in countries considered to have lower risks of Modern Slavery. However, AH's operations and supply chains are predominantly in Canada, Europe, and the United States, which have strict labour and employment laws. In addition, AH aims to take every precaution to research and identify issues while vetting potential suppliers or vendors before introducing them into our supply chain.

Under the Human Rights Policy, if any of our business activities induce a negative impact on human rights or if involvement of such becomes clear, we strive to remedy and rectify the situation through appropriate procedures and dialogue. However, through our assessment of our operations and supply chains regarding the risk of Modern Slavery being used, we did not identify any instances of Modern Slavery. Accordingly, no steps were required to remediate Modern Slavery, or the loss of income associated with remediation efforts.

REMEDIATION MEASURES AND REMEDIATION OF LOSS OF INCOME

We strive to manage, mitigate, and remediate the risk of Modern Slavery being used in our supply chain. As noted previously, our assessment of our operations and supply chains did not identify any instances of Modern Slavery, and therefore, no steps were required to remediate Modern Slavery, or the loss of income associated with remediation efforts.

Management, Mitigation, and Remediation of Potential Risks

Our Code of Conduct, Compliance Hotline, and due diligence measures offer a reporting mechanism for our employees and suppliers to report ethical or legal violations, among other concerns. In accordance with our principles and policies, if a situation of non-compliance is identified, AH will work to develop and implement a corrective plan to improve and remedy the situation. To date there have been no identified or reported instances of loss of income to vulnerable families that resulted from measures taken to eliminate the use of forced labour or child labour in our activities and supply chains.

TRAINING

AH employees receive regular training on various ethical topics and internal policies. A benefit to being part of the ITOCHU family, our employees receive training from ITOCHU on the Human Rights Policy in order to raise human rights awareness and incorporate and implement the Human Rights Policy in our business activities. Presidents, directors, and employees are expected to submit written confirmations declaring that they have reviewed and shall "observe laws and internal rules" annually. In addition, all team members are required to sign off on the Code of Conduct annually.

ASSESSING EFFECTIVENESS

Throughout the year, AH conducts a regular review of its policies and procedures related to forced labour and child labour, and will continue to review those policies to make changes where appropriate. For ongoing efforts, we intend to continue to reevaluate the need to implement

measure to assess the effectiveness of the processes we have in place based on the evaluation of our risks as described in this Report.
